Promises, Promises

Have you ever made a promise to a friend? Did you keep that promise? Make a list of all the promises you've made that you can remember. God's list would be really really long because there are thousands of promises in the Bible. Can you imagine making that many promises and keeping them? When God makes a promise to us, we can have hope.

Know we can have hope because God keeps all His promises.

Rainbow Promise

One promise we learn is that God gave Noah a huge promise at the end of that story in the form of a rainbow. God promised He would never flood the earth again. Gather some rainbow-colored cereal, like Fruit Loops®, a paper plate, and some glue. Separate the cereal pieces into the different colors of the rainbow and glue them onto the paper plate in order. Place this somewhere to remind you that God keeps His promises.

Ask an adult to help you find a box, some crayons and some scrap pieces of paper. On the pieces of paper, write all the things that you are hoping for this Christmas. Once you have finished, place them inside the box and decorate it like a gift. Share the things you are hoping for with your family at dinner tonight. A Savior

Ask an adult to help you look up Isaiah 9:6 and highlight it. Read it out loud. God promised to send a Savior that would bring hope to the world many years before it happened. And that is not the only promise we have been given. All throughout the Bible, God's Story, we find promises from Him. He'll always be with you. God promised there will be a day when there will be no more sadness or hurting. Write Isaiah 9:6 on your hand or bathroom mirror as a reminder of God's promises.

Ask God to help you remember His promises.

DAY 2

Read Isaiah 9:6

It's the Christmas season! Only the most anticipated, most celebrated, most awesome month of the year! And while the presents and lights and decorations are nice; you know what this holiday is really all about? Christmas is about celebrating Jesus, God's greatest gift.

Long before Jesus was born in Bethlehem, God made a promise. You read it in today's verse. About seven hundred years before Jesus' birth, Isaiah (a prophet who spoke on behalf of God) told us that a child would be born, that He would be a mighty God, Everlasting Father and Prince of Peace.

Now, thousands of years *after* God kept that promise, we celebrate Jesus' birth. It's a huge reminder to us that no matter what happens, God is completely trustworthy. **We can have hope because God keeps His promises.**

Think about the last promise you made. Did you keep it? Why or why not? Spend some time thanking God for keeping His promises and ask Him to help you be a promise keeper too.

Read Joshua 21:45

When you hear the word "promise" what do you think about? A promise is to follow through with what you say you will or will not do.



To make a promise or to keep a promise?

It's so much easier to make a promise than to actually follow through and keep that promise. Lucky for us, God never messes this up.

As today's verse reminds us, God kept all the promises He made to His people, the Israelites. Even when the Israelites turned their back on God and tried over and over again to do their own thing. Still, God kept His promise and sent His Son, Jesus. That's why we can have hope. Not just at Christmas but every single day. God can be trusted because God keeps His promises.





Read Ezekiel 12:28

When was the last time someone made a promise to you and that promise was broken? Can you think of an example? Sooner or later, everyone breaks a promise because everyone, including you, is imperfect. Everyone, including you, makes mistakes.

But there is good news. God is not like us. He is completely perfect. There is no wrong or bad or imperfect part of Him. He never messes up, says something He doesn't mean, or "forgets." When God makes a promise, you can trust that it's as good as done. Because God said He would send His one and only Son and because He did, you can trust God, always.

Read Jeremiah 23:5

Today, create some salt dough ornaments to hang on your Christmas tree to remind you of God's promises:

Salt Dough Recipe

Ingredients:

4 cups all-purpose flour

1 cup table salt

11/2 cups warm water

Cookie cutters

A toothpick

Paint or paint markers for decoration

Ribbon for hanging

Preheat the oven to 300° Fahrenheit. Stir together the flour and salt. Slowly add the water, stirring constantly. Knead the dough until soft, about five minutes. Place the dough between two large pieces of parchment paper. Roll out until 1/8 inch thick.

Use the cookie cutters to cut out shapes. Use the toothpick to write the words "HOPE," "LOVE," "JOY" and "PEACE" on four separate ornaments. Poke a hole in the top of every ornament for hanging. Transfer the parchment paper to a baking sheet. Bake for one hour.

Once cooled, decorate the "HOPE" ornament and other blank ornaments with paint or paint markers. Thread ribbon through the top and hang on the tree. Save the "LOVE," "JOY" and "PEACE" ornaments to decorate in the weeks to come.

Read Isaiah 9:6

As you read Isaiah 9:6, underline every word that is referring to Jesus (some are titles; some are simple pronouns). Then circle the description of Jesus that gives you the most hope.


