

"Do not be afraid," the angel said. "I bring you good news for all people... a Savior has been born to you." That "you" included those shepherds. "You" included all the people in the sleepy town of Bethlehem. "You" includes, well, you.


God sent Jesus as a gift for every one of us. Jesus brought peace. He made a way for us to have a relationship with God forever!

But peace is possible, even when you're fighting with your brother. Why? Because of Jesus. Jesus reminds us that even though we will have trouble in this world (like those fights with your sister) it's okay, because He is bigger and stronger than any of the yucky stuff we might face.

Grab your "PEACE" ornament from week one. Decorate the front with paint and run some ribbon through the top. Instead of packing this ornament away with the rest of your decorations, hang this one up in your room all year. Every time you face trouble (like a fight with your brother or a super bad day), remember the PEACE, deep down that you have because of your relationship with Jesus. Ask God to help you tell others about Jesus too because God's peace is for everyone.

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
